

In Memoriam: Thierry "Ted" Henri de Bremond

Thierry "Ted" Henri de Bremond, 87, passed away at home on December 24, 2020.

Born in Aubonne, Fribourg, Switzerland (The French Sector) on August 21, 1933. Ted was the oldest of three children who frequently moved with their parents to accommodate their father's work as a military attaché to the Swiss




government. When he was 18,
Ted was awarded a full
scholarship to attend
Georgetown University and
moved to the U.S., where he
earned a Bachelor of Science in
Business Administration and his
Master of Business
Administration from The George
Washington University. Ted
proudly became a citizen of the
United States on August 10,
1965.

Ted was a production control manager for several companies in the Washington, DC area,

including Hughes Network Systems. In May 2018, he retired from TAD Relocation Services, a senior move management company.

Ted loved the outdoors and coming from Switzerland, downhill skiing was in his blood. Tennis was his first love. He enjoyed the game from an analytical view, as well as a participant. He was active with a senior group, playing doubles twice weekly at the Aspen Hill Tennis and Swim Club. Ted and his wife April were also power boaters. Ted enjoyed water skiing on the Chesapeake Bay and spending the nights in quiet creeks on the larger "boats." He was an Officer on the "Bridge" in the Potomac River Power Squadron (a unit of the U.S. Power Squadron) and a Commodore of the Selby Bay Yacht Club (2002).

Ted's love of dogs consumed much of his life and heart. Ted brought his Corgi, Arthur into his marriage with April. Arthur was 10 years old and they decided he needed a playmate. They met a little dog they named Sabrina and fell in love with the Schipperke breed. Ted soon realized you can't have just one schipperke...so along came Darius, Nicole & Echo. Darius crossed the Rainbow Bridge and Colby



arrived, followed by Nitro a year later. On December 30, 2010, Echo gave birth to Nitro's son, Ryder, in the back of the family van on Connecticut Ave. Ryder was a 'singleton'. When seeing Ryder for the first time, Ted's immediate words were, "That's MY Boy." They became instant BEST buddies and were glued at the hip.

Ryder and Ted went everywhere together, daily walks, training in Obedience, then Rally, then Agility every day (weather permitting). On October 12, 2012, Ryder and Ted achieved their Canine Good Citizen Title. Achieving this AKC title enabled Ted to join Capital Dog Training Club. Ted put the following titles on Ryder: CD BN RE FDC NA NAJ CGCA TKN. The weekend of November 29-30, 2018, Ted drove alone to the Catoctin Kennel Club to complete Ryder's RE title. The last AKC title Ted placed on Ryder was his Farm Dog Title on October 19, 2019. Ted, April and Ryder drove to New Kent, Virginia so Ted could put the second of two legs on Ryder.

Ted enjoyed the friendship at Capital. The Howliday Party and the Awards Dinner making frozen margaritas! Ted loved taking classes with Ryder at Capital. He went on Monday evenings for Obedience classes, Thursday mornings for Rally and Wednesday evenings for Agility (until May 2018). He always took lots of treats for Ryder and a brush to use between runs to ensure that HIS boy was calm and always looked beautiful. Ted was an Assistant Instructor for Introduction to Agility and Beginner Agility. He always tried to increase his knowledge of dog sports and share it with his students. He always brought his book, *The Art of Proofing*, by Adele Yunck to classes and encouraged the students to read the book.

On December 9, 2020, his Occupational Therapist asked him what he would like to work on tomorrow, and Ted replied, "Train my boy, Ryder."

The Pack A New Series on Amazon Prime

The Pack (Amazon

Prime) comprises ten 60-minute episodes, presented by the former alpine ski racer and gold-medal Olympian Lindsey Vonn and her King Charles spaniel Lucy.

The show takes place in a different country almost every week. It



starts in LA and then jets off to Mexico, Italy, Switzerland, France, Austria, the UK and Costa Rica before making it back to the US for a finale in Utah.

Just getting to the location of the first challenge, in the city of angels, requires a helicopter lift from the freeway, followed in quick succession by a zipwire swoop down to a limo and a speedboat ride to a cruise ship. And the prize? \$500,000 for dog and partner, plus another \$250,000 to a charity of their choice. And another \$250,000 is distributed to charities they come across as they travel round the world.

The critics have given The Pack mixed reviews, but I liked it. It plays to a fantasy I have of traveling the world with my dogs. The dogs and their owners get to stay in really posh hotels and the dogs get to sleep on their owners' beds. The show has been criticized for being a bit tame, but these are real dogs doing most of the work and their safety is paramount. Dog safety officers are on hand at all times, and we are shown them often. It is quite obvious that the dogs have all been trained and have had practice doing the stunts and tricks they are seen doing in the show. It is not enough that the dogs are not hurt, the producers of the show do not want them stress when they participate in the show. I liked that too about the show. Most of what the dogs are asked to do is not all that stressful and is easily identifiable to CDTC members. For example, the dogs are required to sit and stay while their owners run to get something. If the dog breaks, they have to start again. They are also asked to find things. The producers make it clear that the dogs have been trained to search for birch sent. For example, in one episode the dogs need to be find puzzle pieces scented with birch. The pack is a combination of a fun travel show with a mixture of obedience, agility, trick training and scent work all rolled into one show. Check it out on Amazon Prime.



Frida - Hero Dog



The good people of Mexico know how to honor a hero dog. After an earthquake which killed 300 people hit Mexico in 2017, Frida, a Navy rescue dog, became famous when images of her clad in a protective eye mask, and boots, searching through the rubble of a school in

Mexico City, drew worldwide attention and became a symbol of hope for Mexico. "Her bark always gave hope, and in moments of pain and uncertainty she brought relief," said Deputy Naval Minister Eduardo Redondo. Frida is credited with saving 12 lives.

In 2019, Frida, age 10, was retired from active duty with the navy. Retired but not forgotten. Frida's image is on the Mexican Peso; she is celebrated in a large colorful mural in the Mexico City. A bronze statue of her, and her handler was erected in Puebla, Mexico. Frida was present for the unveiling. As a social media star and Mexican icon, Frida has also been featured in fan art, on t-shirts, and in comic books. In retirement, she is living her best dog life, helping to train other search and rescue dogs.






BOOK REVIW:

Nop's Trials

It's Christmas day when we meet Lewis Burkholder, West Virginia livestock farmer and sheepdog trainer, and his talented border collie Nop. The holiday is shattered when Nop is stolen. *Nop's Trials* is the story of Nop's fate, the abuse and brutality he suffers and his incredible resiliency. At times this book is hard to read, but when Nop and Lewis are finally reunited, there's not a dry eye in the house. *Nop's Trials* has a cult following. It's not just a book about an extraordinary border collie and the bond that he and his human share. It's about hope and desire and the depth of love and devotion that a dog and a human can feel toward each other. The influence of and passion for this book cannot be underestimated. Until his death in 2018, Donald McCaig received letters from fans from all over the world exclaiming how this book changed their view toward dogs; enhanced their own appreciation of their own canines; or just held them in thrall on the edge of their seats.

McCaig wrote several books about border collies; all are worth reading.

Shannon Hall writes: The closest NADAC equivalent to AKC's MACH is the NATCH - NADAC Agility Trial Champion. I've run NADAC with 3 previous dogs and not gotten one. Connor and I earned our very first NATCH this year on Thanksgiving weekend. We were supposed to be at a trial at Hog Dog, but it was canceled at the last minute due to rising COVID numbers. I was quite sad, as I worked diligently to be ready to only need those last few Qs at that trial to get the NATCH. Instead, due to the generosity of a friend who has a nice flat yard and all the equipment, I got my NATCH virtually, via judged video. While it is rather deflating, it was also quite an accomplishment for us and I look forward to getting NATCH 2, 3, and however many more Connor and I might earn, at physical trials in the year 2021 and in years to come. NADAC sent me lovely ribbons (one for our NATCH, one for what is called the Versatility NATCH, which we also earned) to recognize the accomplishment so I just had to take a photo, which normally would be taken at the trial with the judge present. Very Good Boy, Connor!

[For the curious, a NATCH requires the team to be running at the elite level, and have 23 elite Regular Qs (equivalent to AKC Standard), 13 Jumpers Qs, and 13 Chances Qs (Chances has a distance challenge that is quite a bit harder than the AKC Fast send). To get a versatility NATCH, one must also have 13 Touch and Go Qs, 13 Tunnelers Qs and 13 Weavers Qs.]



Jennie Larkin writes, "Tali, CH Kol Tuv Fuligin Tali CD PCD BN RI FDC OA OAJ AXP MJP NF OFP CAA FCAT3 ACT2 ATT C-CDX CL2 RL2-AOE RLP-AOE CDCA-VI5 CHIC, was named Canaan Dog of the Year by the Canaan Dog Club of America. The club gives this honor every year to a Canaan Dog who exemplifies what is best about the breed. She finished her breed championship early and quickly (in three weekends going Winners Bitch or Reserve Winners Bitch to majors at each show), with much credit going to Capital's Conformation Training Group and especially Jeff Harab. Tali then contributed to the breed by having a lovely litter. Despite these activities, she earned more titles by

the time she was 2 years old than most Canaan Dogs ever earn in their lifetime. Since her litter we have had more time to have fun together. Last year she represented the breed in Orlando at the 2019 Obedience Classic (bonus road trip with Wallace and Julie Rovner), and I was truly delighted at how well she worked! Her heeling, attention, and attitude were everything I could have hoped for! In agility she is now at the Masters level and earned a place at the 2020 agility invitational, which we did not attend because of COVID. Over the months of COVID were have taken to lure coursing (Fast CAT and CAT) and backyard video disc games as socially distanced dog events that Tali loves! She and Tip and I had a great time doing UpDog Video Games this spring, and it was both very fun and a real dog training and handling challenge! She completed her Coursing Ability Advanced (CAA) title over the summer, which requires 10 passing runs on a 600 yard course that is different every time. She also completed her FCAT3 title this fall. Fast CAT is a timed 100 yards straight sprint. Nowadays, Tali is playmate for my new (5 month old) papillon puppy, Hermes. And she really is such a good dog to live with and a wonderful hiking partner. And we are all looking towards brighter times, with more hiking and more dog training and trialing ahead!

Blood Test Streamlines Cancer Detection



Improving the quality of life for dogs is the goal of a newly launched cancerdetection tool.

Texas A&M University College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences (CVMBS) has introduced a costeffective oncology test veterinarians can use for early cancer detection.

Developed by Belgium-based company Volition, the Nu.Q Vet Cancer Screening Test uses a blood test to measure early markers of cancer.

"Unlike in humans, where routine cancer screening is relatively commonplace, there are few tests for animals," says CVMBS professor, Heather Wilson-Robles, DVM, DACVIM (picture above), who helped develop the screening.

"We are changing this today."

"This simple, low-cost blood test can help streamline the diagnostic process and shorten the path to diagnosis, thereby allowing treatment (be that chemotherapy, radiation therapy, or surgery) to be initiated earlier, even before symptoms appear, increasing the chance of the dog's survival and its quality of life."

Cancer is the most common cause of death for dogs older than two in the U.S., according to Texas A&M. Further, as many as 50 percent of all dogs over the age of 10 will develop cancer in their lifetime.

The new test, which is available through CVMBS' Gastrointestinal (GI) Laboratory, can be used during wellness checks of older dogs where there is a suspicion of cancer, as well as in younger high-risk breeds.

At 100 percent specificity, the test has been shown to detect 74 percent of lymphomas and 89 percent of hemangiosarcomas, which are two of the most common cancers in dogs, comprising approximately one-third of canine cancers, Texas A&M says.

"As with human cancers, early diagnosis is key, and this testing will not only save dogs' lives, but will offer dogs a better quality of life through earlier treatment," says John August, BVetMed, MS, MRCVS, DACVIM (SAIM), dean of CVMBS.

NEW CLASSES!

Intro Obedience Skills for Rally Novice: This class provides a quick introduction to several obedience skills that are necessary for participating in Rally. Skills taught include heeling, fronts and finishes. At the end of the class students should be ready to enroll in Rally Novice. Students who are primarily interested in competition obedience are advised to instead enroll in Fundamentals of Competition Obedience 1. This is a 4-week class. We recommend enrolling for Rally Novice (offered consecutively) as well.

Fundamentals of Competition Obedience 2 (FCO2): This class teaches foundation skills necessary for competing in Open and Utility. It is not necessary to have earned a novice title before taking this class, but all dogs must have excellent heeling (on and off leash), and straight fronts and finishes that are performed promptly. Students will have typically completed Fundamentals of Competition Obedience 1 prior to enrolling. Foundation skills that will be taught include: retrieving, go-outs, directed jumping, pivots and scent discrimination. The emphasis will be on providing a firm

foundation in these skills and providing a roadmap for training the actual competition skills. Less emphasis will be placed on training these skills to the point of being competition-ready. Instead, students will be prepared to perfect these skills in open and utility classes. Ideally, this class will be taken upon completion of Fundamentals of Competition Obedience. Permission of the Instructor is required. Email cdtcclasses@gmail.com

ON-GOING CLASSES

Fundamentals of Competition Obedience 1 (FCO1): This class slowly and systematically teaches heeling with sustained attention. Dogs will also be taught to stand, sit and down quickly and without moving out of position. Fast, straight fronts and sits will be taught. Ring entry and sustained connection between dog and handler will also be emphasized. Students enrolling in this class should have a strong commitment to excelling and will be expected to practice between classes. Permission of the Instructor is required. Email cdtcclasses@gmail.com

The Delegates Meeting was held by Zoom on December 2, 2020. The Delegate Forum provided the Delegates an opportunity for a Q&A for Board of Director Candidates. I and Donna did send bios of the candidates to members on the group list. If you have any preferences or comments, please direct them to me before March 1, 2021. Delegates will be voting in March 9, 2021.

In the December meeting, Delegates voted 96% approval of the proposed amendment to allow two National Specialties in 2021. Therefore, all the 2020 trophies and ribbons, etc. planned for 2020 can be used in 2021. It allows for 2020 champions by allowing exhibits to compete and be recognized in all sports areas held at specialties. The events can be held separately or back to back. The decision is up to the parent club. They do have the option of not doing this.

In Orlando in December at the AKC Championship event, Gail Wolaniuk and Joan McFadden were named the 2020 AKC Breeder of the Year. Gail and Joan were presented by Royal Canin this award for their outstanding breeding under the kennel name Unique Poodles. This award honors those breeders who have made an impact on their breed and have dedicated their lives to improving the health, temperament and quality of purebred dogs. They began Unique in 1980 and both are members of Poodle Club of America and the Delaware County Kennel Club.

- · AKC and ESPN signed a 3-year content agreement which brings 100% unique events to stream live on the ESPN App. AKC will produce Championships and competitions for the leading sports network. Each show will give audiences an insight into the fun and intensely competitive world of dog sports.
- · AKC lauds the U.S Department of Transportation on its final rule on travel by air with service dogs. The new rule addresses issues associated with the increase in poorly trained service dogs and emotional support animals that have been brought into airports and on aircrafts in recent years, putting the health and safety of other passengers and crew and aircraft at risk.
