Delegates Corner

- In August, AKC started to add a number of new features on their website to make the information easier to use and create greater awareness of club events throughout AKC.org. These changes will be at no cost to clubs.

Also, in August, enhancements will be improved for the search functionality for the Events Calendar. There will be increased exposure for clubs across the site along with enhanced design of club and event information and clubs and events will be featured on the homepage.

- If anyone has photos of the club's participation at the Montgomery County Fair, I would like to send them to AKC Communications. Introducing communities to AKC dog clubs is a big objective of AKC with the end goal of bringing in new dog folks to the sport.
- Among the club Delegates, there is a big discussion about needs in Louisiana in wake of the flooding disaster. There are NO Reunite Trailers in the state. AKC has offered assistance and did not

received a response. It is our understanding that the situation is critical for animals in the flooded areas. Shelters are helping, but many of them are flooded. Two days ago after hearing nothing, AKC sent funds from the AKC Reunite fund down to two shelters in Louisiana. There is a vet school in Baton Rouge but they have not responded to AKC's query. Some AKC Delegates are proposing clubs hold matches and donate funds along with agility run-thru donations, etc. to raise money to send. I understand there are at least two thousand animals were caught and have needs. I heard on the news that many people were found still in their homes and would not leave because they had their pets and did not want to leave them. Unfortunately, the situation sounds like shades of Katrina. Is there something we can do? There are long term and short term needs.

Giving Thanks— True Sportsmanship

I want to thank Capital's membership for selecting me to receive the American Kennel Club Outstanding Sportsmanship Award for 2016. It was an honor to receive the award and I have fond memories of the members who helped me earn the award by participating in

a variety of club activities.

I came to Capital in 1982 to attend Puppy Kindergarten with my first golden, Amber. For many years, Armand Bailey and Pat Reeves had coordinated the PK program. I assisted them for 10 years. They retired when the club moved to Silver Spring in 1992 and I was ready to teach. Dr. Ian Dunbar, the founder of off leash puppy kindergarten classes using positive re-enforcement training methods was a major inspiration. Ian believed in getting puppies well socialized and making training fun for both the puppies and their handlers. Terry Ryan, another well-known trainer, was a big proponent of learning through games. I enjoyed incorporating games into my classes. As Lois Kietur wrote in the *Obichaff*, I hauled a van load of equipment to class every week. My good natured assistants probably dreaded moving, tugging, and pulling the heavy wood stairs and ramp, the boxes, the tunnel, and the x-pens. I was a firm believer in building a puppy's confidence through climbing on obstacles. My husband said our foyer became a loading dock. He would exclaim to workman as they tip-toed through dog toys, large stuffed animals, costumes, and various surfaces that I used in Puppy Kindergarten classes.

I had a terrific time teaching owners how to train their puppies. The puppies always made me laugh at their antics. They impressed me at the graduation exercises at how much they had learned. Today, when I am at an obedience or a rally trial, I enjoy watching my former students and their dogs.

While I have been a member of Capital, I have also enjoyed helping with the obedience trials. For several years I was in charge of setting up the grounds when our trials were held outdoors. We measured and roped off the rings the day before the trial. On the morning of the trial, we added the baby gating, jumps, tables, and chairs. My strong and cooperative crews were most amused when we loaded the equipment onto the trucks. At that time, the equipment was stored in a small second story room at the Kensington Armory. The stairs were narrow and involved a 90 degree turn! To avoid extra steps, I had my volunteers load the last items we needed onto the truck first. Just before the national anthem was to be played to open the trial I would be checking my list to make sure all was in order. One year, balloonists surprised us by flying overhead. Another year, high winds swept the trial site at Montgomery College. Baby gating and jumps blew over. Fortunately, we had extra rebar and my experienced crew got out the sledge hammers and secured the baby gating and jumps.

Although I have retired from teaching, I am looking forward to working and participating in other club activities. Volunteering is a super way to make new friends, participate in a new activity and enjoy the unexpected. I urge our new members to volunteer for an activity that interests you. I have always found our active members to be generous mentors.

A Primer On Utility Articles— What's Allowed and What's Not!

Articles may be of any shape and size as long as the size is proportionate to the size of the dog. The articles may be items of everyday use.

- The **metal** set must be made entirely of rigid metal.
- The **leather** set must be made of leather.
- The **wood** set must be made of one or more solid pieces of wood.

Wooden Articles

- The wooden set of articles must be made of one or more solid pieces of wood.
- The articles may be unfinished, stained or dyed.
- Must be designed so that only a minimum amount of fastening material is visible.
- The articles will be legibly numbered with a different number.

Must be approved by the judge.

Identification

Articles and the article carrying case must comply with the Regulations Chapter 1, Section 10, Identification.

“No visible means of identification (badges, ribbons, club jackets, etc.) may be worn or displayed by anyone exhibiting a dog in the ring.”

If a dog's or handler's name is VISIBLE (or other means of identifying who was going into the ring), the Judge must not allow the case in the ring.

The key word is “**visible**.” Name tags on a case where the name is NOT visible are acceptable.

A non-identifying picture on articles is allowed, as long as it does not identify who is in the ring.

Summary

- Any **color** or any **shape** is fine for articles.
- Articles may be finished with **dye, stain, polyurethane, shellac, or varnish**.
- Articles may be completely **unfinished**.
- **Paint** is not allowed on articles.
- **Stain**: As the name suggests, stains are coloring agents that are used to change the color or shade of the wood.




Oh, Shenandoah!
